

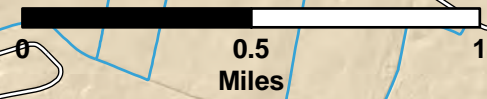

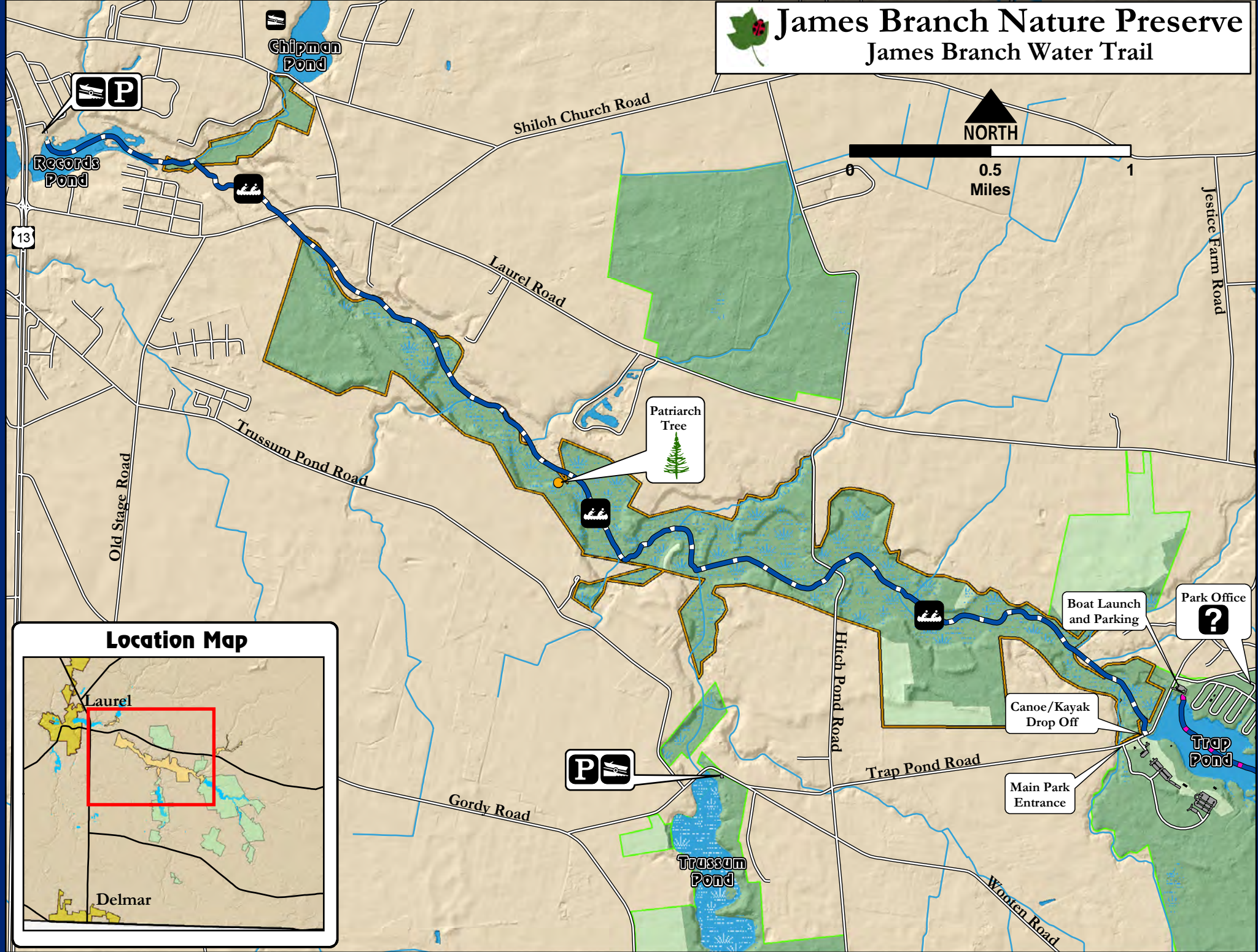

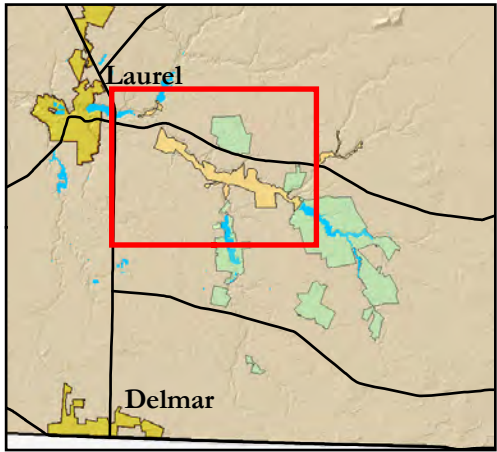

The Nature Preserve

The designation of "Nature Preserve" is the highest level of land protection afforded by the State of Delaware. These lands are rare and often fragile environments that represent some of Delaware's most important natural habitats. The Nature Preserve designation provides a means to protect and conserve Delaware's important natural heritage while guaranteeing its existence for future generations.

Situated between Trap Pond State Park and the town of Laurel, Delaware, the 685-acre James Branch Nature Preserve is the largest of the state's 27 Nature Preserves. The first of nine separate tracts of land was dedicated in 1985, with the latest addition officially dedicated in 2005. The James Branch Nature Preserve is home to the oldest-growth and greatest concentration of baldcypress remaining in Delaware. Canoeing and kayaking the James Branch Water Trail are secondary activities; preservation of the natural resources is the primary land management responsibility of the Division of Parks and Recreation.

The James Branch Water Trail

James Branch offers one of the most spectacular canoe trails in the First State. Peace of mind and a sense of wilderness await the intrepid paddler. The pointy "knees," flared bases and towering heights of the greatest concentration of old-growth cypress in the state create a feeling of seclusion along this spectacular water trail. One impressive "old-timer" known as "The Patriarch" is more than 500 years old. Fallen logs, both submerged and above the water's surface, present navigational challenges and contribute to the sense of wilderness.

Paddling the Water Trail

The Water Trail can be accessed off of Trap Pond Road, just below the spillway, or at Records Pond. Due to the length of the trail and some navigational hazards, the James Branch Water Trail is recommended for intermediate to advanced paddlers. Paddlers will encounter downed trees, low-hanging branches and both floating and submerged logs. The trail is best suited for springtime excursions or during times of high water levels. Shallow water levels, typical in the summertime, make completing the entire trail difficult. Contact the park office for the latest information about water conditions. Please respect the fragile and rare habitats throughout the Nature Preserve so that we may protect them for future generations.
